A PROCLAMATION.

MULGRAVE.

HEREAS an Act was passed in the Second and Third Years of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act to restrain for Five Years in "certain Cases Party Processions in Ireland;" and it was by said Act among other things enacted, That the same should be and continue and remain in Force for Five Years from the passing thereof, and thenceforth until the end of the then next Session of Parliament:

And whereas We have received Information that it has been represented in various Parts of Ireland, that the said Act will expire in this present Month of August, and it is feared that many Persons may be misled by such Representations, and may in consequence incur the Penalties of the said Act, by assembling in Processions, and otherwise offending against its Provisions:

Now We, Constantine Henry, Earl of Mulgrave, Lord Lieutenant General and General Governor of Ireland, in order that no Person may be led astray by such Representations, or be thereby induced to commit any of the Offences specified in the said Act, do hereby inform all Persons whom it may concern, that the said recited Act, according to the Terms and Provisions thereof, will be, and continue, and remain in force from henceforth until the End

of the Session of Parliament to be holden next after the date hereof, and that all those who may be found in the meantime offending against the Enactments thereof will be dealt with according to Law.

Given at Her Majesty's Castle of Dublin this Twelfth Day of August, 1837.
