Description of Lucy Keefe, charged with the Murder of her Husband, Hugh Keefe—about 44 years of age; born at Mountmellick, in the Queen's County; a smart thin Woman; about 5 feet 6 inches high; fair complexion, black hair, 2 teeth deficient in underneath jaw, upper teeth very good; wore a green stuff gown, a grey cloak, and a grey beaver bonnet; and has absconded from Garvary, in the County of Fermanagh.
