A PROCLAMATION.

*EGLINTON AND WINTON.*

**W**HEREAS by a Proclamation of the Lord  
Lieutenant and Privy Council of Ireland,  
bearing date the Thirteenth day of January, in the  
Year One Thousand Eight Hundred and Thirty-  
seven, and made in pursuance of the provisions of  
the Statutes therein particularly set forth and men-  
tioned, it was appointed and directed that, from

and after the Hilary Sessions for the said Year One Thousand Eight Hundred and Thirty-seven, the County of Cavan should be divided into two Divisions, for the purpose of more conveniently hearing and determining Causes by Civil Bill, and of transacting all such Criminal and all such other business as might be cognizable or determinable at any General or Quarter Sessions of the Peace. And it was thereby also appointed and directed that one of the said Divisions, to be called the Division or District of Cavan, should consist of the Baronies of Clanmaghan, now designated Clannahon, Tullyhaw, Tullaharka, now designated Tullyhunco, and Loughtee, otherwise called Upper and Lower Loughtee, now designated Upper and Lower Loughtee, and so much of the Parish of Anna as is situated in the Barony of Tullygarvey; and so much of the Parish of Crosserlough as is situate in the Barony of Castleraghan, and the Parish of Ballyjamesduff which is situate and lies in the Barony of Castleraghan. And it was thereby also appointed and directed that the Towns of Cavan and Ballyconnell should be the Towns for holding Sessions for said District or Division; and that Sessions should be held therein, respectively, as follows—that is to say, Four General Sessions of the Peace for hearing and determining Causes by Civil Bill, and for transacting all such Criminal and such other business as might be cognizable or determinable at any General Sessions of the Peace in each and every year in the said Town of Cavan, in and for said District or Division; and that Two General Sessions of the Peace, for the purposes aforesaid, should be held in each and every year in the said Town of Ballyconnell, for the said District or Division. And it was also thereby appointed and directed, that the other of said Divisions or Districts, to be called the District of Cootehill, should consist of the Baronies of Clonchee, now denominated Clankee and Castleraghan, save and except so much of the Parishes of Crosserlough and Ballyjamesduff as were situate and lie therein, and which had been directed to be added to, and form part of, the said District or Division of Cavan, and the Barony of Tullygarvey, save and except so much of the said Parish of Anna as was situate and lay in the said Barony of Tullygarvey, and which was directed to be added to, and form part of, said District or Division of Cavan. And it was thereby also appointed and directed, that the Towns of Bailieborough and Cootehill should be the Towns for holding Sessions for said District or Division of Cootehill; and that Sessions should be holden therein as follows—that is to say, Two General Sessions of the Peace, for the purposes aforesaid, to be holden in each and every year in the said Town of Bailieborough for the said last-mentioned District or Division; and Two General Sessions of the Peace, for the purposes aforesaid, to be holden in each and every year in the said Town of Cootehill for the said last-mentioned District or Division.

And whereas by an Act made and passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the Fourteenth and Fifteenth Years of the Reign of Her present Majesty, entitled "An Act to consolidate and amend the Laws relating to Civil Bills and the Courts of Quarter Sessions in Ireland, and to transfer to the Assistant Barristers certain jurisdiction as to Insolvent Debtors," it is amongst other things enacted and provided, that from and after the passing of the said Act, it should and might be lawful for The Lord Lieutenant or other Chief Governor or Governors of Ireland for the time being, by and with the advice of the Privy Council, to direct that a General Sessions of the

Peace and Civil Bill Court, or a Civil Bill Court only, should be held any number of times not exceeding four times in every year in all or any of the Towns or Places then appointed, or which might thereafter be appointed for holding Sessions, and that the Lord Lieutenant, or other Chief Governor or Governors of Ireland, for the time being, should nominate and appoint the Baronies, or Half Baronies, or Parishes, for which respectively such Sessions should be held.

And whereas applications have been addressed to Us, Archibald William Earl of Eglinton and Winton, Lord Lieutenant General and General Governor of Ireland, from certain Inhabitants of the said Town of Cootehill, in the said County of Cavan, and from the Guardians of the Poor of the Union of Cootehill, praying that Sessions of the Peace might be holden four times in each and every Year, in the said Town of Cootehill, instead of twice, as at present constituted under said Proclamation, bearing date the said 13th day of January, 1837.

Now We, the Lord Lieutenant General and General Governor of Ireland, in pursuance of the powers vested in Us for that purpose by said recited Act, and by and with the consent and advice of Her Majesty's Privy Council of Ireland, Do hereby appoint and direct that in the Town of Cootehill, and for the District or Division of Cootehill, as now constituted by the said Proclamation, there shall from henceforth, in addition to the Two General Sessions of the Peace so appointed by the said Proclamation to be held therein for the purpose in said Proclamation mentioned, be held also a Civil Bill Court twice in every Year.

And We do hereby ratify and confirm said Proclamation in all respects, save only as the same is altered by this Our Proclamation.

And We do direct that the Chairman of the Quarter Sessions of the said County of Cavan shall appoint the times for holding such Civil Bill Court in the said Town of Cootehill, in and for said District or Division of Cootehill, of which all persons concerned are desired to take Notice.
