

DUBLIN CASTLE,

Office of Arms, July 12, 1850.

IT is His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant's Commands, that all Persons who attend Her Majesty's Palace of the Castle of Dublin, do appear in Mourning on Sunday next, the 14th instant, for His late Royal Highness The Duke of Cambridge, Uncle to Her Majesty; viz.:

The Ladies to wear black silk, fringed or plain linen, white gloves, necklaces and ear-rings, black or white shoes, fans and tippets.

The Gentlemen to wear black, full trimmed, fringed or plain linen, black swords and buckles.

The Mourning to change on Sunday, the 28th instant, viz.:

The Ladies to wear black silk or velvet, coloured ribbons, fans and tippets, or plain white, or white and gold, or white and silver stuffs, with black ribbons.

The Gentlemen to wear black coats, and black or plain white, or white and gold, or white and silver stuff waistcoats, full trimmed, coloured swords and buckles.

And on Sunday, the 4th of August next, the Mourning to cease.

In pursuance of the commands of His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant, these are to give public notice that upon the melancholy occasion of the death of His late Royal Highness the Duke of Cambridge, Her Majesty's Uncle, it is expected that all persons do put themselves into Mourning for ten days, to commence from Sunday next, the 14th instant.
