## OFFICE OF ARMS,

27th August, 1834.

WHEREAS His late Majesty King George the Fourth, when Prince Regent, acting in the Name and Behalf of His Majesty King George the Third, was graciously pleased under His royal signet and sign manual, dated at Carleton House, 22d day of February, 1811, to give and grant to Mathew Weld, of Molesworthstreet, in the City of Dublin, Esq., His Majesty's royal licence and authority that he, and such of the issue of his Father as should succeed to cer tain Estates, should take the name and arms of Hartstonge, in compliance with an injunction in the Will of John Hartstonge, late of Brackenstown, in the County of Dublin, Esq, provided that His Royal Highness's royal concession and declaration was recorded in the Office of Ulster King of Arms of all Ireland, which was done accordingly: And Whereas said Mathew Weld Hartstonge is now dead, and the Estates aforesaid are come to and descended upon his Brother, Richard Weld, Esq, a Major in the Army, these are to certify that by virtue of the before-mentioned royal licence and authority, the said Richard Weld, Esq., has taken the name and arms of Hartstonge accordingly.
