*EGLINTON AND WINTON.*

**W**HEREAS by the provisions of an Act passed in the Seventh Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled, "An Act for Consolidating and Amending the Laws relating to Prisons in Ireland," it is enacted that it shall and may be lawful for the Lord Lieutenant or other Chief Governor or Governors of Ireland for the time being, from time to time by Warrant to be published in the *Dublin Gazette*, to order that any Bridewell shall be discontinued and shall no longer be used as a Bridewell or Prison; and that from and after such day as shall be named in such Warrant in that respect, it shall not be lawful to imprison or confine any person therein under any order or authority, or on any pretext whatsoever, any law, usage, or custom to the contrary notwithstanding:

Now We, Archibald William, Earl of Eglinton and Winton, Lord Lieutenant-General and General Governor of Ireland, in pursuance of the powers vested in Us under and by virtue of the said recited Act, do hereby order and direct that the Bridewell at Roscarberry, in the County of Cork, shall be discontinued and no longer used as a Bridewell or Prison; and that from and after the 1st day of June next, *it shall not* be lawful to imprison or confine any person therein under any order or authority whatsoever; of which all persons concerned are desired to take notice.
